



Architect: O'Connor and Kilham, New York




Description: approximately 50,000 square feet in two floors and a basement; two-story lobby with exhibition space on second floor; rare book room; periodicals room; offices; three seminar rooms; lounge and reading rooms; art room; music listening room (with booths); microfilm reading room; Kenyoniana Room; vault. Three floors of stacks. Surrounding the stacks will be carols and reading areas for students, and enclosed carols for faculty members. The exterior wall treatment will be split-face sandstone with extensive areas of glass.


Construction contract: \$998,000 (allocated in campaign: \$1,000,000)

Progress on the science building as of November 3.


THE PHILIP R. MATHER HALL

Design and construction: The Austin Company, Cleveland


Description: 25,000 square feet in two floors and a basement, six large laboratories; two lecture rooms; one seminar room, three substantial storerooms and one air-conditioned instrument room; three-story science library; five faculty offices with connecting research laboratories. The chemistry department will be housed in this new building, which will be connected with old Mather Hall by a glassed-in passageway. Philip R. Mather Hall will be faced with split-face and smooth-surface sandstone and will have a limestone trim.

Construction contract: \$509,000 (allocated in campaign: \$350,000)



Mid-June: construction of a new lounge for Alpha Lambda Omega in the basement of North Leonard.





Above: exterior of Leonard Hall (east facade). Below: the basement of Leonard, looking from north to south.












